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Sunshine List shines light on \$100K salaries

The annual report stating which public sector employees had a salary of \$100,000 or more was released on March 24. The Public Sector Salary Disclosure, also known as the Sunshine List, is made public on a yearly basis to taxpayers and includes salaries paid and taxable benefits.

Municipality and services

The highest paid municipality worker in Espanola was former Espanola police chief Robert Towns, who collecting \$196,921.77, and a taxable benefit of \$291.76. The current Police Chief Steven Edwards earned \$141,110.45 with a taxable benefit of \$1,731.11 in 2015, following him was chief administrative officer/treasurer Cynthia Townsend earning \$121,314.63, with a taxable benefit of \$1,594.92.

Members of the Espanola Police Service who made the list were: Sarg. William Gardiner (\$119,508.32), Const. Melissa Rancourt (\$115,603.45), Const. Shawn Sullivan (\$113,219.27), Const. Steven Huard (\$110,228.90), Const. Donald St. Pierre (\$106,832.78), Const. Shawn Hawkins (\$106,301.53), Const. Edward Stortz (\$106,064.64), Const. William Lamour (\$104,037.05) and Const. Paula Martin (\$102,224.59).

Margaret Benian, a nurse practitioner with the Township of Sables-Spanish Rivers was the only employee to cross the \$100,000 threshold earning \$113,660.30, with a taxable benefit of \$1,653.99.

Hospital and boards of public health

Former chief executive officer, Ray Hunt, made \$187,015.12 with taxable benefits of \$1,059.30 before leaving Espanola Regional Hospital and Health Care Centre in 2015. His replacement, Nicole Haley made \$155,561.97 with taxable benefits of \$988.36.

Four other health care providers made the list: director of care - long-term care Paula Mitroff (\$102,559.14), chief finance officer Kimberly Roy (\$126,426.02), director of clinical services Jane Battistelli (\$123,174.35) and radiology technician Michael Flabiano (\$101,924.62).

Legislative assembly and offices

Algoma-Manitoulin Member of Provincial Parliament, Michael Mantha made the list earning \$116,550. He also has a taxable benefit of \$240.69.

School boards

Various members of the community made \$100,000 or more in 2014. The three school boards in the area include the Rainbow District School Board (RDSB), Conseil scolaire catholique du Nouvel-Ontario (CSCNO) and the Huron-Superior Catholic school Board (HSCSB).

CSCNO has two school in Espanola, École secondaire catholique Franco-Ouest and École St. Joseph. Franco-Ouest principal Daniel Dalcourt earned \$115,295.29 last year with a taxable benefit of \$551.52. Pierrette Lemieux, principal of St. Joseph earned \$115,295.29 with taxable benefits of \$687.84.

CSCNO board members who made the list include: director of education Lyse-Anne Papineau (\$196,686.16), superintendents of education Monique Chrétien made (\$161,756.57) and Robert Mayer (\$147,673.36). Business and finance superintendent Cathy Modesto (\$160,481.27) and executive director of learning Nicole Sonier (\$136,717.90).

The RDSB has four schools in the area: Espanola High School (EHS), AB Ellis Public School, Webbwood Public School and S. Geiger Public School.

The principal of EHS Martin Punkari made \$123,584.25 and a taxable benefit of \$366.48 while vice-principal Susan Kett earned \$113,078.18 and a taxable benefit if \$336.24. AB Ellis principal Michael Bellrose earned \$123,584.25 and a taxable benefit of \$366.48 and vice-principal Daniel Koziar made \$107,149.81 and a taxable benefit of 317.46.

Top earning board members for the RDSB is director of education Norm Blaseg (\$185,221.99) and superintendent of schools Lesleigh Dye (\$173,210.30).

The final school board HSCDSB has: Sacred Heart Catholic School and St. Mary Catholic School.

Sacred Heart principal Syndy-Ann Withers earned \$117,059.77 last year with a taxable benefit of \$1,293.12 and St. Mary's principal Chris Vuorensyrja made \$116,359.69 with a taxable benefit of \$1,285.68.

Their top board members include: director of education John Stadnyk (\$187,457.63), superintendents of education Maria Esposito (\$157,457.53) and John Bruno (\$157,457.53)

Other public sector employees

Eight people employed with the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board had a yearly salary of more than \$100,000.

Chief administrative officer Fern Dominelli earned \$153,078.80 with a taxable benefit of \$1,026.43, and Peter Finlay was the highest paid paramedic with a salary of \$117,072.19 and taxable benefits of \$555.37.

Others included: chief of emergency medical services Michael Macisaac (\$115,027.36), director of integrated social services Donna Moroso (\$115,027.36) and director of finance and administration Connie Morphet (\$115,027.36).

Three paramedics who also made the list are Mike Cooper (\$111,167.02), John Allison (\$107,891.09) and Paul Zilio (\$101,607.34).

About the list

The list was introduced 20 years ago under the Mike Harris government. When introduced in 1996, it was set to show the income of those who hit the \$100,000 threshold. But, according to the Bank of Canada inflation rate, there has been a 1.85% annual inflation rate and \$100,000 then equals \$144,267.88 now.

But premier Kathleen Wynne stands by the 20-year-old amount, stating the \$100,000 is still a lot of money and is relevant.
