Despite tough times, new programs help students find summer employment

LITTLE CURRENT—Thanks to the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Social Services Administration Board (DSSAB), the Waubetek Business Development Corporation and the Service Canada Centre for Youth (SCCY), many students and youth can rest easy knowing that despite these tough economic times, there are still programs being implemented to help them find employment.

As of June 5, the SCCY opened its doors to the public at the Little Current Cambrian College campus, offering a variety of services to aid youth in their job search, as well as prospective employers. According to its mandate, SCCY

information on federal, provincial and territorial government programs and services.

"We are open from 8:30 am until 4 pm," said Steven Lyle, vouth services officer for the Little Current SCCY. "We offer a variety of services to help youth find employment. All they have to do is come down here and register; we offer wage subsidies as well as other programs. I will be working between Job Connect locations in Little Current and Espanola this summer, and at times various locations throughout the Island."

Another new initiative, entitled Summer Jobs for Youth Program, implemented by the government this year,

allowed the Manitoulin-Sudbury DSSAB and Waubetek enough funding to place 100 students on an eightweek fully subsidized placement for vouth between the ages of 15-18. Receiving over 65 applications, and 42 orders from employers, DSSAB has currently placed 40 students with various employers across Manitoulin Island. Waubetek received enough funding for 50 students and two youth worker leaders for First Nations on Manitoulin Island, and has since filled the positions.

"We filled all 50 positions," said Dawn Madahbee, general manager for Waubetek BDC. "This program has created 100 jobs for people on Manitoulin. It's nice because some of the smaller businesses are getting a chance to get funded. Before this you would see a lot of students working in administrative positions: this businesses."

Students will start their jobs on Wednesday, July 8, and DSSAB hopes to place an additional 10 students within the current funding envelope, for a total of 50 students.

What is particularly unique about this program is that employers receive a full wage subsidy of \$9.50 per hour for up to 35 hours per week. DSSAB also provides administrative payroll service for all employers; however, employers are responsible to pay for and provide WSIB coverage or other insurance as required.

"We do still have some spots left," said Fern Dominelli.
