Dear Ministers, Ms. Lankin and Mr. Sheikh:

Re: Social Assistance and Health

I am pleased to provide you with a copy of the Sudbury & District Board of Health report, "Nutritious Food Basket – Limited Incomes: A Recipe for Hunger 2011".

On behalf of the Board of Health, I urge you to ensure that the findings of this report and those of all nutritious food basket reports from Ontario's 36 boards of health inform the work of the Commission for the Review of Social Assistance in Ontario.

Each year boards of health are required to collect local data using a standardized Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC) survey to determine the actual costs for families of various sizes to eat healthfully. Every year our data highlight that households on social assistance or minimum wage cannot afford a nutritious diet after paying for housing costs and other basic necessities such as transportation, clothing, and personal care items.

The Sudbury & District Board of Health would like to bring to your attention the recommendations and findings from three previous initiatives:

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The 2007 Sudbury & District Board of Health motion asking the Government of Ontario to:

Implement (Ontario Works) OW and (Ontario Disability Support Program) ODSP rates that reflect the cost of living and are indexed annually to reflect inflation, including the findings of yearly Nutritious Food Basket costing conducted by local Boards of Health based on protocols established by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care".

The 2002 Coroner's Inquest recommendations following the 2001 death of Kimberly Rogers: The Ministry of Community, Family, & Children's Services and the Ontario Works Program should assess the adequacy of all social assistance rates. Allowances for housing and basic needs should be based on actual costs within a particular community or region. In developing the allowance, data about the nutritional food basket prepared annually by local health units and the average rent data prepared by Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation should be considered. Rationale: To ensure that social assistance rates are adequate and adjusted annually if necessary.

The 2009 Wellesley Institute report, Sick and Tired: The Compromised Health of Social Assistance Recipients and the Working Poor in Ontario:

Higher rates of chronic disease and poor health were documented among social assistance recipients as compared with the non-poor. In some cases, these rates were 7.2 times higher. These findings are consistent with those found in our Sudbury & District Health Unit studies and many others from across Ontario.

Every Board of Health has a legislative duty to undertake activities to prevent the spread of disease and promote and protect health of the people who reside in our area. Boards of health are keenly aware of the poorer health outcomes of Ontarians living below the poverty line. We are also keen to work in partnership with you to eliminate barriers to health and reduce costs to the health care system.

Thank you for your commitment to these important matters. The Sudbury & District Board of Health looks forward to further dialogue and a decision to incorporate local food costs into social assistance calculations as a measure to support health and reduce illness.
